Target Audience

Physicians, Nurses, Residents, PAs, Students, and all interested staff.

Educational Objectives

- Define Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) and their prevalence, health disparities in these data, toxic stress physiology, and related impacts on health, including underlying biological mechanisms.
- Identify how to introduce and integrate ACEs and toxic stress screening into clinical care, aligning with trauma-informed care principles.
- Apply the ACEs and Toxic Stress Risk Assessment Algorithm for assessing risk for toxic stress, which includes a combination of screening for ACEs, identifying presence and extent of ACE-Associated Health Condition(s), and protective factors, in determining an appropriately tailored treatment and follow-up plan included referrals, if indicated.
- Identify the Medi-Cal payment requirements for administering ACE screening as a part of assessing for risk of toxic stress.
- Define trauma-informed care and identify ways to incorporate trauma-informed care practices in a clinic setting.
- Identify resilience-building practices for staff and patients and local available resources for referrals and warm-hand offs.
